I would like to start by offering a personal message about what I see could be some potential positive outcomes from Covid 19.

We are all in the middle of what, less than a few months ago, could not have been thought possible. Every day we are presented with terrible news. However, some positive things are becoming evident from this pandemic.

### Theosophy is not a set of beliefs

Excerpts from On The Watch Tower, 1966, by N. Sri Ram (ch. 30, p 430-432)

Many people think that Theosophy is a set of ideas or beliefs which are professed by those who call themselves Theosophists. But Theosophy is something which exists in Nature; it is Truth, it is Wisdom, and it is other things that follow from these. Truth is something which exists irrespective of doctrines and labels. The wisdom which we know as Theosophy would smell as sweet under any other name. There are people who are put off by the label "Theosophy". They think that Theosophists must be a kind of sect or religious body, added to all the sects and religious bodies which exist already. We should see that as far as possible there is no ground for such a conception of ourselves.

Sometime ago I came across a book called *Theosophy of the Upanishads*, written some decades before the Theosophical Society came into existence, which shows that Theosophy is a certain wisdom, not just a name by which a group of people are divided from the rest of humanity. What is there in a name, which is but a description, provided the name indicates the truth? The name "Theosophy" was chosen, I believe, in order to identify it with a Wisdom which existed in the past, not only at one particular time, but at different periods, and to indicate its profoundly philosophic and transcendent character. That which is spiritual is ageless, it is only the forms that can be dated. Let us always bear in mind the fact that when we use the word "Theosophy", we refer to a universal Wisdom which has been studied in all ages, exists in the present, and operates in Nature all the time, which we merely recognize under various terms that we might employ.

We must be careful never to negate or diminish this universality of Truth, and of the doctrine which is but a statement of the Truth. It is the beauty and fragrance of the rose which matters, and not the name at all. To perceive Truth, to understand how things happen, to know that there is a certain order in the universe, certain laws behind the phenomena we perceive, physical as well as psychological, is more like seeing than believing. We are not called upon to stuff our minds with all kinds of ideas, but rather to open our mental eyes and see.

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### Theosophy is not a set of beliefs (continued..)

Excerpts from On The Watch Tower, 1966, by N. Sri Ram (ch. 30, p 430-432)

Theosophy is a vision of Truth. When you open your physical eyes, you do not see a blank, you see the earth, the waters and the sky, in their proper delineations and relations. Our understanding of Theosophy should be as natural and free as all that. If another person does not see exactly what we do happen to see, we can have no quarrel with him. If he says he does not see the color of these walls as yellow, whereas to us it looks yellow, there is no ground of complaint against him nor cause for disputation. I do not see why the same attitude cannot be adopted towards anyone who does not perceive the truth of any matter dealt with in Theosophical books, or perceives it differently.

The truth which is in Theosophy should profoundly modify our attitude to people, things and events. It will do so when we actually perceive it as the very expression of life. Because it is so beautiful, when we do know it or feel it, it causes us to see the whole world in terms of that beauty.

We refer to the unity of Life. Suppose you realize it as a fact in some measure, then you cannot but look at every living being with whom or with which you come into contact in a different way, you will then have a different manner, a different approach, a different tone of voice from what obtains in this divided and contradictory world. To be a Theosophist is more than anything else to have the feeling of the universal life, from which springs goodwill towards all beings and the realization that they are as much a medium for the experience of freedom, beauty and truth as yourself. Then the good fortune, the opportunities which come to them, their happiness and freedom are as precious as what may come to oneself and those closest to oneself. It is this expansive all-embracingness, and a sensitiveness in ourselves, which will make the Theosophical Society a true vessel of the perfect or spiritual Wisdom.

Towards those who might have left the Society we can have the same feelings. What does it matter if they did leave a particular grouping which did not suit them? They were impelled by certain motives or factors guiding the pathway of their life. They might have organized themselves into other Theosophical groups or be active under some other names. That does not diminish the brotherhood which exists and which we should be able to feel towards them.

If we are true Theosophists, we should meet every man on his own pathway, allow him the necessary freedom and take a living interest in his welfare. After all, we are all one in spite of the fact that each is experimenting on his own lines, experimenting with Life and Truth. (Dec. 1955)
